School Days for Payette

In late October, I enrolled my youngest equine child, Payette in elementary school. He had reached the age where he was big and strong enough to start the riggers of going from a pasture pet to a working trail horse. While still a long way from a fully-grown horse, he is 3 1/2 this November, his mind is mature enough to start that transition. Over the three year that he has lived with me, Michelle Hart who does his

feet, and I have worked with him on his ground manners, loading into a trailer, and other skills a trail horse needs. i have been ponying him over many miles of trail, he has stood patiently tied to a high line, crossed creeks, mud and bridges.

For this next step in his training, I contacted Shannon Allison, a friend and horse trainer, who worked for many years starting horses used by the Simplot Company at their ranches and feed lots. Shannon and I agreed that he would work with Payette for around a month, continuing his groundwork and starting him under saddle.



On a sunny afternoon, my mother Mary, who was visiting from Michigan, and I loaded up Payette, without one of his buddies in my old green trainer and started the long drive to Grandview, ID where Shannon's ranch is located. Poor Payette, was not a very happy camper, he likes riding in the trailer, but not alone, I am sure he was convinced bad things were going to be happening, but my mom and I had a lovely visit as we made the trip. Once we arrived, Payette was unloaded and introduced to the pen he would be staying in. Shannon and I discussed expectations and he outlined his training plan for the first two weeks. Those of you who have ridden with me, know my preferred headgear is a hackamore. Shannon showed me his collection; some are real works of art, and the one he planned to use during Payette's training.

I was out of state for the next few days, attending training for my job but kept in touch by email to find out how he was doing. Shannon assured me that he was setting in, and holding his own with the other horses. Shannon also said that he was popular with the girls that work with him. I was able to go visit Shannon and Payette at his two-week point to see how he was progressing with his lessons. Payette seemed happy to see me and greeted me at the gate; he was calm while I put a halter on him. I took him over to Shannon's round pen and Shannon demonstrated many of the things they had been working on. It was like going to your child's parent teacher conference & school open house. The only thing missing was picture the kids had drawn.

This first two weeks, a lot of the lessons Payette had been learning were to deal with and give to pressure. Some of these lessons he understood right off the bat, but others he has been resisting. He is a proud mustang. To get over his aversion to having bug spray applied, Shannon has emptied dozens of spray bottles of water on him until he now just stands there, not very happy but still.

They have started the under saddle lessons, and Payette has so far not tried to buck, but Shannon said it is like riding a tightly coiled spring. The lesson plan for the next few days is to work at loosing the coils a bit, and starting rides out side of the round pen.
